In 2009, Jeevan Life Seva Sanstha was granted non-governmental organization status, and it has since become one of Maharashtra's leading advocates for tribal and Adivasi rights. As the demand for its services grew, it continued to grow as an organization, taking up new campaigns and causes. The word "Seva" means "to aid," and "Sanstha" means "organization." As a result, the Jeevan Life Seva Sanstha is a social service organization in Maharashtra, we focus on issues of advocacy and development for indigenous tribes. We aid tribal communities in addressing a variety of issues that help the destitute, orphaned, poor, and others live more comfortably and achieve their goals. Its purpose is to protect the tribal or Adivasi people's traditional, constitutional, and human rights.

To safeguard, teach, provide basic necessities, rehabilitate, and establish strong communities and loving families, to provide children aged 6 to 18 a childhood and a future.

PAST ACTIVITIES



2013

- Drinking water distribution to 7 communities in Talkua-Jat, Sangli Dist. The total number of beneficiaries was estimated to be around 350 families.

2016

- 5.5 million liters of water were distributed to six villages in Taluka Akole, Dist. Ahmednagar, as well as a 40 thousand liter artificial lake. A total of 900 people were helped.

2018

- 150 blankets were distributed to the elderly who were living on the streets.
- 5000 cotton bags were distributed to support the Maharashtra government's anti-plastic campaign.

2020

- The importance of Adhar and Pan Card was discussed at an awareness camp in Adiwasi padas. SC/ST Empowerment Programs Developed by the Government
- 6000 people were benefited from the Mask Distribution.

2015

- Brand Factory has partnered with Children's Home Chembur and Adivasi Pada in Neral to distribute new clothing. There were 400 people in all that benefited.

2017

- Arrangements for traditional and cultural events for underprivileged students in the vikhroli area. A total of 250 students, ranging in age from 6 to 14, was benefited.

2019

- Distribution of 4 tons of ration items in the flood-affected village of Dudhgaon, Sangli district. There were 240 families in all who were benefited.

2021

- Clothes and sweets were distributed at the Adiwasi padas of Ware near Karjat. The total number of people who were benefited are 150.

INTRODUCTION



Tribal people in India are commonly referred to as "Adivasis," and the government recognizes them as scheduled tribes (STs). Since time immemorial, Scheduled Tribes (STs) and Scheduled Castes (SCs) have been the disadvantaged sections of society due to socioeconomic exploitation and isolation. According to the 2011 Census, India's ST population was 104.5 million, accounting for 8.63 percent of the country's total population. In 2011, Maharashtra's tribal population was 10.5 million, accounting for 9.35 percent of the state's overall population. The state boasts the country's second-largest tribal population, second only to Madhya Pradesh, accounting for 10% of India's overall ST population. Maharashtra state boasts the country's largest tribal community in terms of numbers. Despite the fact that the ST population in India is less than the general population, they demand special attention because they are socioeconomically and culturally disadvantaged and isolated from the rest of the country. There are significant distinctions among STs in terms of numerical strength, settlement history, geographical region, livelihood pattern, dialect, tradition, social development, social inclusion, and developmental objectives.

BACKGROUND

As early as India's independence, provision was made in the 5th Schedule of the Constitution of India for the administration and management of scheduled territories and scheduled tribes, in acknowledgment of their backwardness and need for government assistance. Equal rights and opportunities; protection against discrimination on the basis of caste, religion, race, sex, and other factors; reservation in appointments and in Lok Sabha, Legislative Assembly, and Local Government seats; protection against social injustice and all forms of exploitation; and so on are all constitutional safeguards for the welfare, development, and protection of STs. Parts of the Thane, Palghar, Nashik, Gondia, Dhule, Ahmadnagar, Pune, Nanded, Nandurbar, Raigarh, Amravati, Yavatmal, Gadchiroli, and Chandrapur districts are included in Maharashtra's Fifth Schedule area. Maharashtra is one of the 10 states with areas listed in the Fifth Schedule.

Maharashtra, with over ten million tribal people, has a significant role to play in tribal welfare.

PROBLEM STATEMENT

For a variety of reasons, children in tribal communities have a worse situation than children in non-tribal areas.

Thousands of young tribals lack access to elementary education, health care, adequate nourishment, and better life possibilities. Despite decades of efforts to better their economic conditions and educational levels, much more has to be done in huge swaths of tribal territories across the country. With our grassroots-led development programs within tribal communities, we seek to play a key role in bridging the gaps in tribal welfare in education, health, nutrition, and other issues. We are attempting to develop and implement effective education, nutrition, and livelihood methods for school-aged children in tribal regions while demonstrating a loving and caring environment.

TRIBAL REHABILITATION CENTER

Our main goals are to establish a shelter for orphans where they can find a home, a family to love and care for them, as well as to educate them and offer them vocational training.

The center's purpose is to advance the life, welfare, and development of Maharashtra's marginalized and discriminated tribal and rural groups. Our expert team members will work directly with varied communities to combat poverty, education, and marginalization by utilizing their skills, knowledge, and extensive work experience.

In accordance with the tribal people's resources, needs, cultures, and traditions, the Center will take self-help, holistic, and bottom-up approaches and become self-reliant and powerful, with better living conditions that do not jeopardize their cultural and environmental identities

TO ESTABLISH AN ORPHANAGE

We go out of our way to find such children and admit them to schools, as well as cover their study expenses, so that the children or their parents do not face any difficulties in completing their education.

TRIBAL TRAINING



Tribal people refer to Adivasis, a villager who lives on daily earnings due to a lack of knowledge, skill, and illiteracy. They are unable to feed their families and sometimes sleep on an empty stomach due to limited resources. For these people, we have established a free tribal training institution where we train them in wrapping, sorting, packaging, electrician, painting, masonry, stitching, and a variety of other skills while also assisting them in finding work.

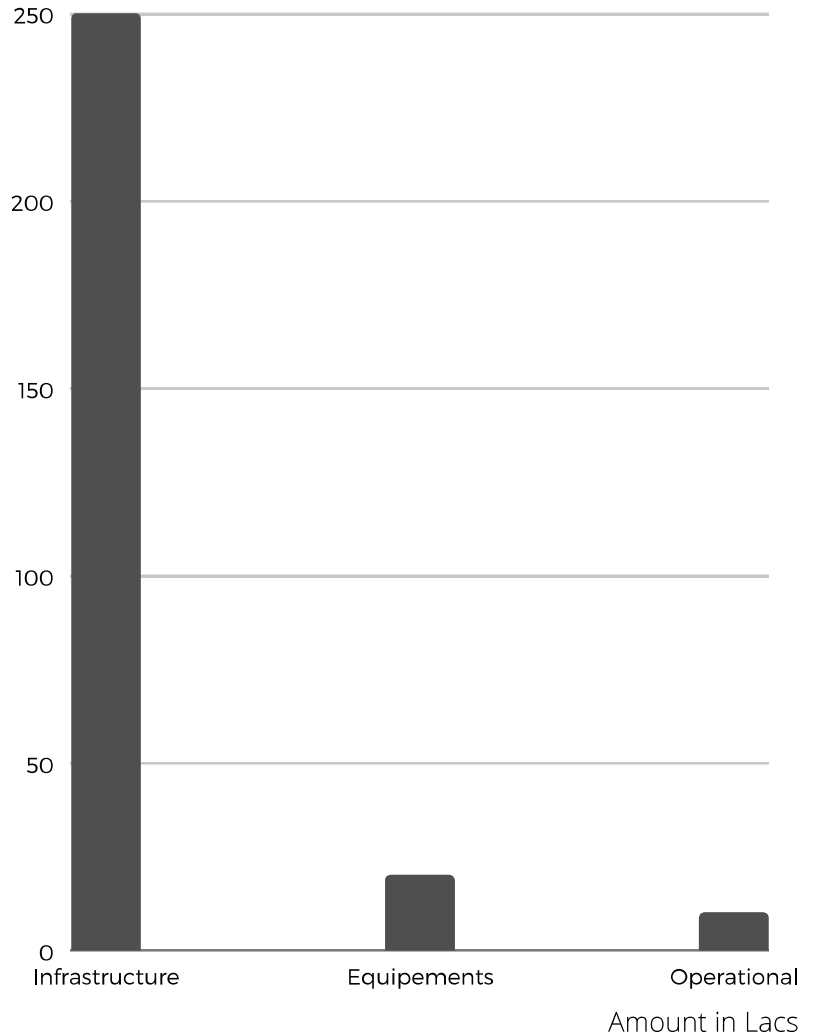
